January courses can normally be taken by all Masters students (both degree students and Discovery non-degree students), as well in the case of some travel courses sometimes including spouses or guests of students or the seminary.

For more detailed information on courses, as it becomes available, see Part C of this document.

PART A – J-TERM REQUIREMENT

The January Interim Requirement: All WTS degree students must complete one or more January Interim (aka "J-Term") courses, one for each year of primary coursework as defined for their program. Master of Divinity degree students currently must complete three (3) J-Term courses. Master of Arts in Diaconal Ministry degree students currently must complete two (2) J-Term courses. Students in the current one-year Master of Arts degree program (Fall 2019 and following) need to complete one (1) J-Term course.

The Cross-Cultural "January" Requirement: For students in the Master of Divinity and Master of Arts in Diaconal Ministry degree programs, as well as students in the older two-year Master of Arts degree program (but not students in the new one-year degree program), one of your J-Terms currently must be reserved for completing the Cross-Cultural requirement. Normally the means of fulfilling the cross-cultural requirement is by completing a designated course that is designed as a group-based course that involves immersion activities (and often travel of some form). Most of these eligible cross-cultural courses are January courses. Independent studies are normally not allowed for meeting the cross-cultural requirement except in situations approved ahead of time by the Academic Dean upon petition.

J-Term Course Grading: All J-Term courses are graded with Credit/No-Credit grading only.

Limits to January Registration – One "J-Term" Course Per Year. Due to financial aid restrictions (by the U.S. Department of Education and their Title IV program), only one course per year can be registered for in each January Interim. This includes courses where travel occurs outside of January (such as in August or May) if they are considered meeting the January course requirement and/or the cross-cultural requirement. This restriction includes independent studies. January courses have their own tuition fee.

PART B – COURSE OFFERINGS

I. CROSS CULTURAL COURSES

The following courses all meet the MDiv/MADM (and older MA degree) cross-cultural degree requirement when completed as a cohort, including pre- and post-January meetings. The faculty person named is the local contact for the course, and in most cases the person you will work with in completing the pre- and post-trip requirements for the cross-cultural requirement, as well as sign off on the final grade. Please see that person for more information about the specific trip or course. All cross-cultural courses are usually numbered MN 398W unless noted otherwise.

These cross-cultural courses will have some number of cross-cultural travel subsidies available for that course as provided through Wartburg's Financial Aid Office, which can be used by students completing their first cross-cultural experience as required for their degree program to offset some of their travel expenses. (See Barb Roling, Financial Aid Office, for details on how these cross-cultural travel subsidies work and your eligibility.) The number of these travel subsidies is currently left unspecified, to allow for some flexibility in reassigning monies to a different trip if one is over- or under-subscribed as compared to another.

A. Elective Courses Held during January

- **IN 281W Fascism and Fiction New course added on November 15**, to be taught by Samuel Giere. - MN 103W **Pastoral Practicum** (arranged between you and a pastor/church, with a faculty member's oversight). A specialized independent study whereby the student focuses on ministry in a church setting (e.g., "shadowing" a pastor, or completing a specialized ministry project, etc.) Student must complete an independent study form as part of the registration process in order to outline the goals of their practicum. See the section below on independent studies for more information on the amount of work that needs to be arranged for.

IV. Known J-Term Opportunities that are offered by/through another ELCA seminary: Each year there are courses are shared between the ELCA seminaries. Often times courses are shared through a long-standing cross-registration agreement between these seminaries that the student normally pays their home seminary the expected J-Term tuition fee, and then the student only pays the other host seminary any additional expenses needed for their local onsite participation.

Through Luther Seminary (Twin Cities area, Minnesota):

• Diaconal Ministry: History, Formation, and Spirituality (J-Term 2023) To be held in-person at the Mount Olivet Retreat Center (Farmington, MN), from Sunday, January 8, starting at 4:00 p.m., and going to Friday, January 13 at 4:00 p.m. Current understanding is that students will pay WTS the normal J-Term tuition (as an ELCA seminary cross-registered exchange course), but that Deaconess Community also has a scholarship process to offset at least some of the costs. Besides the WTS Registrar sending Luther Seminary a cross-registration form, there is a separate application process with Luther Seminary also needed to be in this course. See Part C starting on page 6 for more course details.

V. Other known January opportunities that are not part of the ELCA cross-registration program

J-Term HSP Offering. See Part C (page 13) for a course offering offered as part of the Hispanic Summer Program (HSP), a multi-seminary consortium that WTS participates.

This particular J-Term offering, **Race and Religion in the U.S.**, is not part of the ELCA cross-registration program, but may be of interest to you, especially if you are completing our Hispanic Ministry Concentration. You will need to follow the application process describe and will need to independently arrange for transfer credits back to WTS in order to count as a J-Term course. ACT FAST, AS APPLICATIONS ARE DUE BY NOVEMBER 18. You would not pay WTS tuition in this case, but instead need to pay their expected tuition as indicated to the school involved.

VI. INDEPENDENT STUDY or PASTORAL PRACTICUM

For those students who do not complete one of the cross-cultural courses or specified organized activity courses listed above, your remaining option is to complete an independent study or a pastoral practicum. For students in the new curriculum (Fall 2016 and newer) MDiv, MA, and MA in Diaconal Ministry degree programs, all J-Term independent studies are expected to meet the requirements for a 2-credit course (which equates to a minimum of 90 to 95 hours of work). For any remaining students in the legacy degree programs (pre-Fall 2016 MDiv, MA, or MA in Diaconal Ministry), a J-Term course/independent study is a 3-credit course (which equates to a minimum of 135-145 hours of work). There is an Independent Study Contract Form to be completed in conjunction with the faculty member who will oversee your independent study or pastoral practicum, and the form is also signed by your faculty advisor. These contracts need to be finalized by the December registration week.

MN 398W GENEVA – TAIZÉ – STRASBOURG IMMERSION, January 2023 – Syllabus

Dr. Martin Lohrmann

2 credit hours; fulfills cross-cultural J-term requirement; credit/no credit only

COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this travel trip, participants will gain familiarity with global Christianity through immersive visits to institutions including the World Council of Churches, Lutheran World Federation, Institute for Ecumenical Research, and the Taizé community, actively experiencing and considering crosscultural issues like religious identity, worship, and Christian witness in diverse global contexts.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. To grow in faith and knowledge by engaging significant institutions in world Christianity.
- 2. To consider issues of religious identity and global Christian witness.
- 3. To consider Christian responses to challenges facing the global church through practices like worship, dialogue, and cross-cultural education.

These course objectives reflect and serve the values of the "12 Pastoral-Diaconal Practices of Wartburg Theological Seminary," especially the Practice of Complex Analysis (5), the Practice of Immersion in the Context (11), and the Practice of Cross-Cultural and Global Dimensions (12).

PROCEDURE

Leaving on overnight flights from the US on January 9, 2023, we will meet in Geneva, Switzerland, on January 10. Because Wartburg students live all over the country, participants will make their own flight arrangements. Our time in Geneva will focus on global Christianity and global Lutheranism, meeting with representatives from the World Council of Churches and the Lutheran World Federation.

On Sunday, January 15, we will take a train to the Taizé community. We will spend the week immersed in that worship community.

We will then take a train to Strasbourg, France, on Sunday, January 22, where we will spend time with Dr. Theo Dieter and the Institute for Ecumenical Research. We will leave Strasbourg on Thursday, January 26. Students need to arrange return travel from Strasbourg.

Participants are responsible for having necessary passports. Full COVID-19 vaccination is required; seasonal flu shots are also highly recommended.

A deposit of \$500 is due to the Wartburg financial offices by October 14, 2023. This amount will be applied to housing costs and other expenses incurred during the trip.

REQUIRED READING – to be completed before the trip Jason Brian Santos, *A Community Called Taizé* (InterVarsity Press, 2008)

EVALUATION

Learning will be evaluated through active participation, conversations about readings and experiences, and a journal that contains observations about the assigned book and reflections about the travel experiences. Participants will contribute to a group presentation of our cross-cultural immersion on Monday, January 30, 2023.

MN 398W MALAYSIA & THAILAND, JANUARY 2023

Hello, Wartburg community!

I hope you are keeping well and taking time to rest, refresh, and recharge this summer.

The J-Term trip to Sabah and Bangkok will take place from **January 4-21, 2023**. Cognizant of an extension of COVID restrictions in Hong Kong that have created uncertainty in travel decision-making, it has been deemed prudent to visit Bangkok, Thailand, instead of Hong Kong. The adjustment to the itinerary means that the trip will include visiting both Sabah, Malaysia, and Bangkok, Thailand.

We will meet at The Kota Kinabalu International Airport in Sabah, Malaysia, on January 4. Please note that participants will make their own flight arrangements: USA to Sabah, Sabah to Bangkok, and Bangkok to USA. More information will be shared in a Zoom session in August.

Theme of the trip is Exploring Multiculturalism in/across Asia

Sabah, Malaysia (Jan 4-16, 2023)

The Lutheran Study Centre in Sabah will work with us and provide all the assistance we need during our stay in Sabah.

Places to visit include:

- a. 1 day session on understanding local Sabah cultures
- b. 2-day visit to local ministries, cultural and social work centres in Kota Kinabalu
- c. 4-day visit to Sapulut (interior visit) Murut indigenous community
- d. 3-day visit to Kudat/Pitas (interior visit) Rungus Community

On Monday, January 16, we will travel by plane to Bangkok, Thailand.

Bangkok, Thailand (Jan 16-21)

In addition to debriefing sessions, we will meet an ELCA missionary to learn about the work of the ELCA with its global partners in the region, and do some sightseeing.

Estimated costs for this trip: \$3,500 to \$4,000, including airfare, in-country travel, and room and board. I am anticipating a group of 12 (max). Spouses and family members are welcome, but priority is given to Wartburg students.

According to the Malaysian entry regulations, all persons entering from the United States of America must be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and must have received at least one booster shot. Please stay up to date with your COVID-19 vaccines and boosters and bring valid certification(s) of your vaccination and booster shots.

A Zoom session will be offered to provide information about the trip and answer questions. The meeting also includes a presentation of the uniqueness of Sabah as a state of Malaysia and the work of The Lutheran Study Centre there, by Rev. Dr. Eric Trozzo, who was on the faculty of Sabah Theological Seminary, directing The Lutheran Study Centre, through ELCA Global Mission. It will happen in August, exact date to be determined.

In Person J-Term Session: January 4-14, 2023

The ministry of the Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center is to foster mutual trust, respect, and understanding while addressing the poverty that exists on the reservation. This J-term course seeks to offer a cross-cultural opportunity for seminary students that will shed light on the role the Christian Church has played in the development of our shared story with the Lakota people both for harm and for healing. This will help students to explore their calling in ministry in this age of racial and spiritual reckoning.

PROGRAM FEE: \$700.00 per student. Half the fees are due December 1, 2022, with the remaining \$350 due the first day of class. (For WTS, this payment is January 2023 -- Page 8 of 19

usually coordinated by the Business Office and paid through your student account, with a full payment made to the PRRC on your behalf.)

SCHEDULE: Each day will consist of 2-3 presentations/activities and conclude with a talking circle. Students will be expected to participate in the presentations and talking circles. A more detailed schedule for the course will be provided as the dates get closer.

Presenters will share their experiences of life on the Reservation, hopes and views about economic and housing issues, the impact of the Wounded Knee Massacre of 1890, and generational trauma. Activities will include visits to local historical sites and ministries as well as conversations around video clips and articles including topics of boarding schools, accompaniment, and advocacy.

MN 398W DISMANTLING RACISM

Dates: Jan. 11-25

Time: 9am-2pm daily (Central)

Course Desc:

This course examines racism in the US, celebrates BIPOC cultural excellence, and invests in strategies to dismantle the societal harm of racism. It is open to all students; each student will be expected to take responsibility for describing their own need to learn. This course is being offered with honest awareness that white people have specific work to do. The course aims for students to have a significant encounter with, arguably, two cultures previously less-than-familiar to them:

- 1. BIPOC: Black, Indigenous, People of Color are people of culture with many diverse perspectives of excellence. Hearing from many authors and speakers of color, recognizing the grinding impacts of constant, systemic racism, thinking theologically about contexts that include structural racism, and learning to celebrate BIPOC cultural excellence will help form valued leaders and hopefully shape the ELCA to act in alignment with antiracism.
- 2. Whiteness; Many white students are as yet unfamiliar with their own whiteness. It is crucial to recognize one's own racial identity in order to care about all people being treated with dignity, to work for equity in our church and world, and to learn how whiteness is centered and how people participate or disrupt the centering of whiteness. This course will invite white students, in a supported, accompanied manner, to recognize their own whiteness and begin to come to terms with the immunity/privilege it affords them, and therefore the responsibility they are perfectly free to embody. Thus, this course has repercussions for how students view their own culture.

We will use many methods of learning: discussion, lecture, videos, art, reading, and activities.

MN 396W HOLDEN VILLAGE Winter Sojourn & Reading Seminar

Enjoy an opportunity to spend one full week (7 days, Friday to Friday) "in" at Holden Village for a winter spiritual sojourn. We will join the Holden winter community in this beautiful and rugged setting in the Cascade Mountains of Washington state. The rhythm of daily life will mirror the rhythm of the Holden community, including worship, prayer, reading, conversation, work, play, and table fellowship. The focus for our reading will be determined by those who will be participating in conjunction with the Instructor.

You may choose your preferred mode of travel for this trip. Professor Frambach will travel by train* with the following general itinerary: departing from Lacrosse, WI on a Tuesday evening (Jan. 10th), arriving into Wenatchee early Thursday morning (Jan 12th), spend the day and overnight in Wenatchee, take the boat up Lake Chelan to Holden Friday morning (Jan 13th), arriving at Holden Village mid-day on Friday; leaving Holden mid-day on the following Friday (Jan 20th), arriving back into Wenatchee Friday afternoon, boarding the train Friday evening (Jan. 20th) for the return trip, arriving into Lacrosse, WI on Sunday morning (Jan. 22nd).

Twelve (12) days total **if traveling by train**. If you choose other modes of travel, please see below*

Dates: dates at this point are January 12th—20th (*not inclusive of travel*).

Cost: Estimated total cost of \$1000—\$1,200 based on the following breakdown and dependent on your mode of travel (all costs approximate at this point):

- 1. Travel (round trip): \$300--\$500 per person; rooms on the train incur added cost per person (rooms include meals in Dining Car, access to shower on board). Check Amtrack.com for current fare & room rates or your preferred airline.
- **2. Holden Village**: \$250.00 for the week (this could change depending on the 2023 J-term rates which have not yet been determined)
- 3. Lady of the Lake (Lake Chelan boat/ferry): \$36.00 round trip
- 4. Wenatchee, WA: one night hotel (shared) and meals; approx. \$100.00
- **Miscellaneous:** you will need money for food/drinks as you travel, especially if you travel by train and do not have a sleeper (sleepers are nice and include meals, but they can get pricey); you can also bring food & drinks (within reason) on board the train; and they do have a store at Holden Village with all sorts of stuff for purchase—from candy bars to books to music to apparel.

*If you wish to travel by train, the route you will choose is the **Empire Builder**, originating at Chicago's Union Station and terminating in Seattle, WA.

If you wish to travel by air, please plan on arriving in Wenatchee on Thursday, January 12th and departing on Saturday, January 21st. This will likely involve another overnight, whether in Wenatchee or close to SeaTac airport.

Likewise, if you choose to drive, please plan on arriving in Wenatchee on Thursday, January 12th. We will return to the Chelan/Wenatchee area late afternoon on Friday, January 20th. Please contact Professor Frambach with any questions, especially relating to travel.

MN 396W Preaching and Spiritual Formation

Samantha Gilmore

Elective – Residential and Synchronous Zoom. (Contact Samantha Gilmore about possibility of an asynchronous section being created if enough students can commit.)

Open to all

Two credits

Credit/No Credit Grading

ENROLLMENT LIMIT CAPPED AT 15 STUDENTS, AND AS OF 6 OCTOBER IS ALMOST FULL.

Preaching can serve as a form of spiritual guidance, certainly for hearers, but also for preachers. This course invites in-depth exploration of the spiritual preparation and experience of preaching, seeing the ministry of proclamation as a means through which God in the power of the Holy Spirit forms us and ultimately works to transform us. Students will gain tools to sustain the preaching life in the long term.

Objectives

As a result of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Articulate an understanding of preaching as spiritual formation for both the preacher and the listeners (*Practice of Bring Rooted in the Gospel; Practice of Missio Dei in Word and Sacrament*).
- 2. Practice increased attentiveness to God's presence and a "desire for God" while also cultivating the "love of learning" that will help foster the preaching life (*Practice of Personal Faith and Integrity*).
- 3. Interpret sacred and secular texts and contexts through the lens of God's Spirit active in individual lives and in the world (*Practice of Complex Analysis*).

Procedure

This course will meet from January 2 to 12, 2023, 9:00 am-12:00 pm, Monday through Thursday. Teaching and learning methods will include 1) interactive lecture, 2) group discussions and activities, 3) practicing imaginative and spiritual disciplines that aid in "sustaining the preaching life," and 4) preaching and post-preaching reflection. Students will feed their imaginations by engaging with art outside of their normal genres of entertainment. They will develop and turn in a contemplative intellectual journal of their experiences both inside and outside of class.

Evaluation

This course will require active participation, collegial interaction, arriving to class on time, and being prepared to discuss assignments and preach in a way that manifests clear evidence of engagement with course materials.

Diaconal Ministry: History, Formation, and Spirituality

Servant leadership, Word and Service, and diaconal ministry are all synonyms for the ancient Greek word, diakonia, the call of Christ to serve others for the sake of the gospel. We invite you to accompany others interested in learning more through our January seminary elective course.

The Course:

- Introduces students to the historical, theological, and social contexts in which the work of diaconal ministry has been expressed through the church's history.
- Provides a particular focus on ways in which that history continues to impact the present.
- The course provides significant opportunity for the development of spiritual disciplines and vocational discernment.
- This course meets the formation requirements for those entering the Word and Service Roster.
- Pre-work is required.

Course Goals:

- To present a theological grounding for discernment.
- To learn about the ministry of Word and Service throughout the Church's history.
- To experience and talk about intentional community.

Instructors:

- Susan Wilds McArver is the H. George Anderson Professor of Church History at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. Dr. McArver has been involved in the education of diaconal ministers and deaconesses for over 20 years.
- The Rev. Gary Dreier has over 25 years of ministry experience as a spiritual director, congregational
 pastor and campus pastor. Pastor Dreier will lead the class in exploring and participating in spiritual
 practices.

Funding:

This course was created by the Deaconess Community of the ELCA, also serving the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada to share the history, spirituality, and impact of diaconal ministry with the whole church. Students who take this course in 2023 will receive up to \$1900 towards tuition or travel/housing costs paid by the Deaconess Community. This gift is for all students, not only students interested in Word and Service Ministry or joining the Deaconess Community.

Race and Religion in the U.S.

This course analyzes the historical emergence, development, and relationship between race and religion in the United States. The focus is on the socially constructed, critical and mutually shaping realities of race and religion, especially as it relates to notions of identity, citizenship, and belonging. This

course also emphasizes the importance of settler colonialism and empire as crucial contexts for understanding race and religion, as well as the systemic and structural dynamics at work in their interrelationship. Particular attention is given to the Christian tradition (broadly and diversely defined) due to its prevalence in the history of U.S. racial construction, racism, and anti-racism, and to Latinx religious/ theological perspectives as it engages issues related to race and racism. Course will be taught entirely online.

Tour Mission Statement: To explore the roots of Christian faith where it first took shape, to pilgrimage in the footsteps of worshipers past and present, and to encounter the faith and witness of people living in the lands of Palestine and Israel today.

Troy Troftgruben serves as Associate Professor of New Testament at Wartburg Seminary. An ordained pastor (ELCA), he has ongoing fascination with the places and ways early followers of Jesus gathered and worshiped—in the Middle East and elsewhere. Having led a previous trip to the Holy Land, Troy brings to this experience a familiarity with New Testament connections, an appreciation for the practice of pilgrimage, and a concern for the life of Christian communities in the Middle East. Troy is excited to welcome members of the Wartburg Seminary community to experience with



him what it means to be a pilgrim in lands both sacred and marked by ongoing conflict.

DAY-BY-DAY ITINERARY

TUES, 03 JAN Depart U.S.

A meaningful journey of learning and discovery begins today. Depart Chicago on the overnight flight to Zurich with Swiss Airlines. (Meals in-flight)

WED, 04 JAN Arrive Tel Aviv/Bethlehem

Connect in Zurich with the continuing flight to Tel Aviv. Upon afternoon arrival (2:50 pm), meet your guide and driver for the transfer to Bethlehem. After hotel check-in and time to refresh, gather for a welcome dinner. Sunrise Hotel, Bethlehem (Meals in-flight, D)

THURS, 05 JAN Bethlehem

Begin the day with a visit to Manger Square and the Church of Nativity. Visit the Mosque of Omar and meet for a discussion of Islam. Then continue to the Wi'am Center for a conversation over lunch with Zoughbi Zoughbi, Director of the Wi'am Center for Conflict Resolution. Take a walking tour of the Aida Refugee Camp where Palestinians have lived since being forced from their homes in 1949. Also tour the Separation Wall to understand its impact on the Palestinian community. Sunrise Hotel, Bethlehem (B, D)

FRI, 06 JAN Bethlehem

This morning is the Orthodox Christmas. Begin the day with a walking tour of the Old City of Bethlehem and then return to Manger Square to partake in the Greek Orthodox Christmas celebration. Join the locals as they experience the many Scout Troups accompanying the Patriarchate as they walk down the ancient Star Street to the Church of Nativity. After lunch, drive to the Dar al-Kalima University College and tour the campus and meet with the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb to hear about the role of Palestinian Christians in the Holy Land. Sunrise Hotel, Bethlehem (B, D)

SAT, 07 JAN Masada/Qumran/Dead Sea

Visit Qasr al Yahud on the Jordan River, a baptismal site near Jericho. Then travel to Masada where, on this rocky plateau, the Zealots held their last resistance against the Roman conquerors. Continue to visit Qumran to see the actual caves where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found. Finally, drive to the Dead Sea for some free time and an optional swim. Sunrise Hotel, Bethlehem (B, D)

SUN, 08 JAN Bethlehem

Worship at Evangelical Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem (Arabic service) followed by fellowship. Next drive to Efrat for a tour of this Israeli settlement and meet with one of its residents. Continue to Hebron to visit the Tombs of the Patriarchs (traditional burial site of Abraham and Sarah) at the Ibrahimi Mosque. Tour this complex Palestinian city with a representative of the Hebron Rehabilitation Committee (HRC). Return to Bethlehem. Sunrise Hotel, Bethlehem (B, D)

MON, 09 JAN Bethlehem/Galilee

Depart for the Mediterranean coast and the site of Caesarea, once the Roman capital of Palestine. See the Crusader fortifications, the Roman amphitheater, aqueduct, and the harbor from where the Apostle Paul was taken to Rome. Meet with Elias Chacour in Ibilin. Abuna Chacour was Archbishop of the Melkite Greek Catholic Church in Galilee, an ambassador for non-violence, and noted for promoting reconciliation between Arabs and Israelis. Visit the Melkite Church and after lunch at Mar Elias school, continue to the Sea of Galilee to check in at your guesthouse for dinner and overnight. Mount of Beatitudes Guesthouse (B, L, D)

TUES, 10 JAN Galilee

This morning see the first century "Jesus Boat" at Nof Ginosar kibbutz, followed by a boat ride on the peaceful waters of the Galilee. Visit the Ancient Synagogue and St. Peter's House at Capernaum. Drive along the north shore to Tabgha to visit the Church of the Multiplication and the Chapel of the Primacy of Peter. Mount of Beatitudes Guesthouse (B, D)

VED, 11 JAN Galilee

Begin the day at the Church of the Beatitudes, one of the most beautiful in the Galilee region. Then visit the excavations at Chorazim before driving north, near the Lebanon border. Visit Tel Dan and Banias Springs (Caesarea Philippi), a source of the Jordan River. Ascend to the Golan Heights. Return to hotel. Mount of Beatitudes Guesthouse (B, D)

THURS, 12 JAN Galilee/Jerusalem

Drive to Mount Tabor and visit the Church of Transfiguration. Continue to Nazareth. Visit the beautiful chapel at the International Mary of Nazareth Center overlooking the Basilica of the Annunciation. Visit the Basilica and excavations the English to the Church of St. Joseph. After lunch continue south to Bet Shean to visit one of the country's largest arche-

ological sites which includes the amphitheater, the ancient wall that surrounded the city, public baths, and other well-preserved structures. Drive south to Jerusalem and check into your hotel for dinner and overnight. Gloria Hotel (B,D)

FRI, 13 JAN Jerusalem

Start the day at Mt. Zion to visit St. Peter in Galicantu, the church that commemorates Peter's betrayal of Christ, and its model of Byzantine Jerusalem. Continue to the Coenaculum, also called the Upper Room (Mk 14/Lk 22), the traditional site of Jesus' last supper with his disciples. From here we proceed into the Old City and make our journey along the Stations of the Cross (the Via Dolorosa or Way or Sorrows) concluding with a visit to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, built on the sites commemorating Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection. Continue to the Wailing Wall and welcome the Shabbat. Then walk to our hotel for dinner and overnight. Gloria Hotel (B,D)

SAI, 14 JAN Jerusalem

Stop at the top of the Mount of Olives for a glorious view of Jerusalem. Visit the Pater Noster Church (Our Lords' Prayer) and then walk down the Palm Sunday Road to the Garden of Gethsemane. Meet with a representative of the LWR-funded Augusta Victoria Hospital. Tour the only hospital that serves Palestinian refugees. Lunch will be at the hospital. Meet with a representative of B'Tselem, the Israeli Information Center for Human Rights in the Occupied Territories. Gloria Hotel (B, L, D)

SUN, 15 JAN Jerusalem

Attend the Lutheran service at the Church of the Redeemer. Then drive to Yad Vashem, the moving memorial to the Holocaust; lunch on own there. Continue to the Israel Museum to study the model of Jerusalem from the Second Temple period and see the original Dead Sea Scrolls at the Shrine of the Book. This evening meet with Ophir Yarden to learn about the life of the Jewish people in the land of Israel and his perspective on what will make for a resolution of conflict. Gloria Hotel (B, D)

MON, 16 JAN Jerusalen

Begin the day at the Western Wall and the Temple Mount. The Western Wall is the holiest site in Jerusalem for Jews; and the Temple Mount, or Haram al Sharif, with the Al Aqsa Mosque, is equally sacred for Muslims, second only to Mecca (no inside visits to the mosques available). See the Church of St. Anne, a 12th-century Crusader church, and the Pool of Bethesda. Meet with the English-language pastor at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer. Gloria Hotel (B, D)

TUES, 17 JAN Jerusalem

Start the morning with a visit to the Garden Tomb. The rest of the day is entirely free for individual pursuits. You may wish to walk the ramparts, climb the tower of the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, explore the Citadel Museum, the Franciscan Museum, or spend some time in the Old City shops. This evening, gather together for a farewell dinner at a nearby restaurant. Gloria Hotel (B, D)

WED, 18 JAN Return to U.S.

Very early morning check out of hotel and transfer to airport for final departure. (Meals in flight)
