## **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course utilizes a seminar format and will help students working on a Major Research Project, Thesis, or any major research paper to hone topics, explore resources, develop research skills, and form a writing community.

- 1. To assist in the development of research topics and research questions in a collaborative seminar environment (Practice of Collegiality);
- 2. To explore the gathering of bibliographic sources and other research materials through print and electronic media (Practice of Curiosity);
- 3. To examine the use of sources (Practice of Complex Analysis); and
- 4. To review proper methods of documentation (Practice of Complex Analysis).

#### **PROCEDURE:**

Assignments will be geared toward helping students work toward laying the foundations for the writing of their major research projects or theses.

#### **EVALUATION:**

Assessment will be based on completion of readings and class assignments together with a final paper of a focused research topic, a set of questions, a preliminary bibliography, and a working outline for the proposed projects or theses.
