IN142W Formation for Discipleship: Vocation, Witness, and Ministry

In this course, we will reflect theologically on the baptismal foundations of Christian formation. We will critically examine our vocational callings informed by faith in Jesus Christ, which frees us for lives of witness and service in a complex world. Life together, in community and as community, centers us to explore ministry and mission.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To appreciate, deepen, and reflect theologically on the baptismal foundations of Christian formation (Practice of Biblical and Theological Wisdom).
- 2. To consider the contextual and systemic challenges of race, ethnicity, class, gender and other isms (Practice of Engagement with Cross-Cultural and Global Dimensions).
- 3. To explore our vocational callings as the priesthood of all believers, grounded in God's grace in Jesus Christ which frees us for lives of witness and service in a complex world (Practice of Being Rooted in the Gospel).
- 4. To understand forms of ministry needed in the church today for worship, learning, and leadership in building up the body of Christ (Practice of Collegiality).
- 5. To explore understandings of vocation, ministry, and discipleship among our ecumenical partners to prepare us for collaborative ministry, both locally and globally (Practice of Ecclesial Partnership).
- 6. To experience life in Christian community and consider how the Spirit is at work in and through Christian community (Practice of Personal Faith and Integrity).

PROCEDURE:

Interactive lectures and discussion in small groups.

EVALUATION:

Attendance, participation, completion, and critical engagement of required readings/resources, short reflection papers, and final paper with annotated bibliography. Asynchronous learners engage class video, offer original postings, and respond to classmates' postings.
