## **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

The course aims to accompany students in developing questions, principles and practices that will assist congregations to be vital, faithful, and missional worshiping communities in the North American context today. Baptismal promises and covenant call Christians time and again into worship practices. Baptismal waters are not stagnant waters. In light of baptismal vocations, religious leaders notice deep needs of the assembly and the world, resist those practices that defy God by devaluing humans and/or creation and obscuring hope in the cross and resurrection of Jesus Christ, and walk with assemblies into the Spirit's ongoing and life-giving renewal. Incorporating imagination of a future for worshiping assemblies in conversation with historic traditions, confessional commitments, emerging cultural realities, and a missional ecclesiology, students show their learning through preparation and enactment of the rites such as ordination, funeral, Easter Vigil, and marriage and the intersection of these rites with personal experience, cultural practices, and social forces. Grounded in the practice of baptism and baptismal identity in relation to the way the community of the church ritually marks life's significant passages, students compose a theologically and biblically grounded liturgy for the life of the world. Lecture, presentation, liturgical leadership, research, book discussion, and group dialogue will shape this course.

The course is intended for those who have had some significant experience of ministry in a congregational setting.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

- to consider the practice of baptism as a principal passage of the Christian life and the foundation in baptismal identity crucial to the ritual practice in Christian communities of catechumenate, confession and forgiveness, ministry to the sick and dying, burial, and marriage.
- to understand that the reformation call for ongoing renewal requires resistance to practices that defy God by devaluing humans and/or creation and obscuring hope in the cross and resurrection of Jesus Christ.
- to explore the rites provided for these services and occasions in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* and *ELW: Pastoral Care* and *ELW: Occasional Services for the Assembly*
- to discern, imagine and compose a liturgy called for by the life of the church, attending to the liturgical, theological, and pastoral issues related to these rites and their conduct.

## **Pastoral Practices**

The course aims to address the following Wartburg Seminary pastoral practices:

- practice of Missio Dei in word and sacrament
- practice of complex analysis
- practice of biblical and theological wisdom
- practice of pastoral concern
- practice of curiosity

### **PROCEDURE:**

Lecture, presentation, liturgical leadership, research, book discussion, group dialogue, “visits” to worshipping communities
