**Online Courses for Masters Credit and Distributed Learning Programs:**

During our transition to a “hybrid” classroom/online format whereby off-campus students complete the same course as the residential students, using web cameras and recorded lectures along with Moodle components, only a few specific online courses are being taught. The following are being taught during this transition:

BI 221E/222E Hebrew Bible 1 (2 credits for 221E, intended for MA students; 3 credits for 222E, intended for MDiv students), Sayler.

HT 213E Lutheran Confessions (3 credits), Lohrmann

**NOTES:**

Prolog Week and Intensive Week takes place from September 5-9, 2016, and has its own schedule.

**MN 195W Rural Plunge – This intensive will take place November 4-6, which is a Friday afternoon through Sunday course.**

Area Electives are **limited to 8 students in each taking the course as an area elective**, with first priority to final-year MDiv students, with others as elective. The Biblical “capstone” and the Theology capstone are limited to half the final-year MDiv class in each course, with others as elective.

MN 386W will be taught as an intensive – Thursday, Sept. 22, from 6:30 to 8:20 p.m., Friday, Sept. 23, from 8:00 to 9:20 a.m., 10:40 a.m. to 12:30 noon, and from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m., and on Saturday, Sept. 24 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

IN 003W Graduate Writing will be taught via Zoom/web camera.

**WTS Registration Notes:**

WTS courses marked with an asterisk (\*) have enrollment controls placed on them for the specific purpose of balancing registration between sections or between similar courses. These courses are usually for a targeted group of students to meet programmatic requirements, with outside registration possible only by permission of the instructor. The WTS Registrar reserves the right to shift a student to a different section of the same course or to a course that meets the same program requirement in order to meet this request for a balanced enrollment, and will make all efforts to work with the student to resolve conflicts as a result of this requirement.

Many WTS courses have the preferred option of only the Credit/NoCredit (i.e., pass/fail) grade option, and are so indicated by the ampersand (&) symbol. Other courses may have a preferred grading plan (with an alternative option by permission of instructor). See the course descriptions for more information.
